#### **Writing War Fiction Gender And Memory:**

Writing War Lynne Hanley, 1991 Americans in this century have been largely spared the ravages of war Though some have fought and died on foreign fronts few have experienced invasion occupation or bombing at home and so our narratives of war are particularly potent in shaping our imagination indeed our very memory of war And since how we imagine or remember or forget war has a great deal to do with our propensity to make war the question occurs What is it in our literature of war in our modern cultural memory of war that has led us in this century to make war again and again and to export our organized violence to just about every corner of the world Impelled by this question Lynne Hanley here explores the ways in which literature shapes our perceptions of war The book contains five critical essays on English and American writings about the wars of this century and six short stories which render the experience of war from a feminist perspective The combination of fiction and nonfiction unorthodox though it may be represents Hanley's deliberate effort to open new ways of thinking about war and to challenge the dichotomy between criticism and creative writing The first essay an insightful critique of Paul Fussell s The Great War and Modern Memory takes issue with its focus on the combat experiences of the individual soldier as though his were the only real human tragedy in the arena of war Other essays address the writings of Virginia Woolf Joan Didion and Doris Lessing women whose work calls into question the accepted terrain of war literature and explores new territory beyond the men at the front accounts Hanley's short stories further redefine the combat zone Reexamining the themes of the critical essays the stories explore the experiences of women children and other noncombatants on the home front These narratives displace the soldier as the mouth piece of war reminding us that the makers of war are not its only casualties Gendered Wars, Gendered Memories Ayşe Gül Altınay, Andrea Pető, 2016-04-06 The Introduction of this book is freely available as a downloadable Open Access PDF under a Creative Commons Attribution Non Commercial No Derivatives 4 0 license available at http www taylorfrancis com books e 9781315584225 The twentieth century has been a century of wars genocides and violent political conflict a century of militarization and massive destruction It has simultaneously been a century of feminist creativity and struggle worldwide witnessing fundamental changes in the conceptions and everyday practices of gender and sexuality What are some of the connections between these two seemingly disparate characteristics of the past century And how do collective memories figure into these connections Exploring the ways in which wars and their memories are gendered this book contributes to the feminist search for new words and new methods in understanding the intricacies of war and memory From the Italian and Spanish Civil Wars to military regimes in Turkey and Greece from the Armenian genocide and the Holocaust to the wars in Abhazia East Asia Iraq Afghanistan former Yugoslavia Israel and Palestine the chapters in this book address a rare selection of contexts and geographies from a wide range of disciplinary perspectives In recent years feminist scholarship has fundamentally changed the ways in which pasts particularly violent pasts have been conceptualized and narrated Discussing

Eisler, 2022-12-14 Choice Outstanding Academic Title 2024 Senators Bob and Elizabeth Dole Biennial Award for Distinguished Book in Veterans Studies winner Who writes novels about war For nearly a century after World War I the answer was simple soldiers who had been there The assumption that a person must have experienced war in the flesh in order to write about it in fiction was taken for granted by writers reviewers critics and even scholars Contemporary American fiction tells a different story Less than half of the authors of contemporary war novels are veterans And that s hardly the only change Today s war novelists focus on the psychological and moral challenges of soldiers coming home rather than the physical danger of combat overseas They also imagine the consequences of the wars from non American perspectives in a way that defies the genre s conventions To understand why these changes have occurred David Eisler argues that we must go back nearly fifty years to the political decision to abolish the draft The ramifications rippled into the field of cultural production transforming the foundational characteristics authorship content and form of the American war fiction genre Writing War in the Twentieth Century Margot Norris, 2000 The twentieth century will be remembered for great innovation in two particular areas art and culture and technological advancement Much of its prodigious technical inventiveness however was pressed into service in the conduct of warfare Why asks Margot Norris did violence and suffering on such an immense scale fail to arouse artistic and cultural expressions powerful enough to prevent the recurrence of these horrors Why was art not more successful through its use of dramatic emotionally charged material its ability to stir imagination and arouse empathy and outrage in producing an alternative to the military logic that legitimates war Military argument in the twentieth century has been fortified by the authority of the rationalism that we attribute to science Norris argues Warfare is therefore legitimized by powerful discourses that art s own arsenal of styles and genres has limited power to counter Art's difficulty in representing the violent death of entire generations or populations has been particularly acute Choosing works that have become representative of their historically violent moment Norris explores not only their aesthetic strategies and perspectives but also the nature of the power they wield and the ethical engagements they enable or impede She begins by mapping the altered ethical terrain of modern technological warfare with its increasing targeting of civilian

populations for destruction She then proceeds historically with chapters on the trench poetry and modernist poetry of World War I Hemingway s A Farewell to Arms and Erich Maria Remarque s All Quiet on the Western Front both the book and the film of Schindler's List the conflicting historical stories of the Manhattan Project a comparison of American and Japanese accounts of Hiroshima Francis Ford Coppola s film Apocalypse Now and the effects of press censorship in the Persian Gulf War By looking at the whole span of the century's writing on war Norris provides a fascinating critique of art's ethical power and limitations along with its participation in as well as protest against the suffering that human beings have brought upon themselves Gender and warfare in the twentieth century Angela K.
