-ff -ll -ss -zz (Floss Rule)	When a one-syllable word ends in the /f/, /l/, /s/ or /z/ sound, double the final f, I, s, or z afte the short vowel. <u>Examples:</u> stuff, bill, mess, buzz
c- k-	Use c before a consonant or vowels a, o, and u. Use k before the vowels e, i, and y. <u>Examples:</u> cat, cot, cut, key, kiss
-k -ck	When a one-syllable word ends in the /k/ sound, use -ck after a short vowel.  Examples: peck, sick, rack  However, use a k after a consonant, long vowel sound and after two vowels.  Examples: milk, rake, speak
-ch -tch	When a one-syllable word ends in the /ch/ sound, use -tch after a short vowel, use -ch otherwise.  Examples: hatch, witch Exceptions: rich, which, much, such
-ge -dge	When a one-syllable word ends in the /j/ sound, use -dge after a short vowel, -ge after a consonant or long vowel.
