

Symonds, 2010-11-01 Finding the Family in Medieval and Early Modern Scotland Elizabeth Ewan, Janay Nugent, 2017-03-02 In this interdisciplinary collaboration an international group of scholars have come together to suggest new directions for the study of the family in Scotland circa 1300 1750 Contributors apply tools from across a range of disciplines including art history literature music gender studies anthropology history and religious studies to assess creatively the broad range of sources which inform our understanding of the pre modern Scottish family A central purpose of this volume is to encourage further studies in this area by highlighting the types of sources available as well as actively engaging in broader historiographical debates to demonstrate how important and effective family studies are to advancing our understanding of the past Articles in the first section demonstrate the richness and variety of sources that exist for studies of the Scottish family These essays clearly highlight the uniqueness feasibility and value of family studies for pre industrial Scotland The second and third sections expand upon the arguments made in part one to demonstrate the importance of family studies for engaging in broader historiographical issues. The focus of section two is internal to the family These articles assess specific family roles and how they interact with broader social forces issues In the final section the authors explore issues of kinship ties an issue particularly associated with popular images of Scotland to examine how family Writing British Infanticide Jennifer Thorn, 2003 Writing British networks are used as a vehicle for social organization Infanticide tracks the ways that the circulation of narratives of child murder in eighteenth and nineteenth century Britain shaped perceptions and punishments of the crime and more elusively hierarchies of class and gender The essays brought together in this volume pose the question How are we to understand the proliferation of writing about child murder in eighteenth and nineteenth century Britain the overlap of an expanding print culture with the widely evident narration of this particular crime Further what are we to make of the recurrent and remarkably consistent representation of child murder as the special province of unmarried desparate women Focussing on specific instances of the transformative effect of the circulation of narratives of child murder Writing British Infanticide takes as its purview not child murder per se but the ways that writing about its credentialed and differentiated writers in different but often overlapping genres and moments in a key period in the expansion of print Jennifer Thorn is an Assistant Professor of English at Duke University Edinburgh Companion to Scottish Traditional Literatures Sarah Dunnigan, 2013-08-20 This collection of essays explores the historical importance and imaginative richness of Scotland's extensive contribution to modes of traditional culture and expression ballads tales and storytelling and song Its underlying aim is to bring about a more dynamic and inclusive understanding of Scottish culture Rooted in literary history and both comparative and interdisciplinary in scope the volume covers the key aspects and genres of traditional literature including the Gaelic tradition from the medieval period to the present Key theoretical and conceptual issues raised by the historical analysis of Scotland's rich store of ballad song and folk narrative

are discussed in separate chapters. The volume also explores why and how Scottish literary writers have been inspired by traditional genres modes and motifs and the intermingling of folk and literary traditions in writers such as Burns Scott and Hogg It also uncovers the folkloric and mythopoetic materials of early Scottish literature and the vitality of neglected aspects of Scottish popular culture Women, Infanticide and the Press, 1822-1922 Nicola Goc, 2016-02-17 In her study of anonymous infanticide news stories that appeared from 1822 to 1922 in the heart of the British Empire in regional Leicester and in the penal colony of Australia Nicola Goc uses Critical Discourse Analysis to reveal both the broader patterns and the particular rhetorical strategies journalists used to report on young women who killed their babies Her study takes Foucault s perspective that the production of knowledge of facts and truth claims and the exercise of power are inextricably connected to discourse Newspaper discourses provide a way to investigate the discursive practices that brought the nineteenth century infanticidal woman known as the Infanticide into being The actions of the infanticidal mother were understood as a fundamental threat to society not only because they subverted the ideal of Victorian womanhood but also because a woman s actions destroyed a man's lineage For these reasons Goc demonstrates infanticide narratives were politicised in the press and woven into interconnected narratives about the regulation of women women s rights the family the law welfare and medicine that dominated nineteenth century discourse For example the Times used individual stories of infanticide to argue against the Bastardy Clause in the Poor Law that denied unmarried women and their children relief Infanticide narratives often adopted the conventions of the courtroom drama with the young transgressive female positioned against a body of male authoritarian figures a juxtaposition that reinforced male authority over women Alive to the marked differences between various types of newspapers Goc s study offers a rich and nuanced discussion of the Victorian press s fascination with infanticide At the same time infanticide news stories shaped how women who killed their babies were known and understood in ways that pathologised their actions This in turn influenced medical judicial and welfare policies regar Maternity and Romance Narratives in Early Modern England Karen Bamford, Naomi J. Miller, 2016-05-06 Though recent scholarship has focused both on motherhood and on romance literature in early modern England until now no full length volume has addressed the notable intersections between the two topics This collection contributes to the scholarly investigation of maternity in early modern England by scrutinizing romance narratives in various forms considering motherhood not as it was actually lived but as it was figured in the fantasy world of romance by authors ranging from Edmund Spenser to Margaret Cavendish Contributors explore the traditional association between romance and women both as readers of fiction and as tellers of old wives tales as well as the tendency of romance plots with their emphasis on the family and its reproduction to foreground matters of maternity Collectively the essays in this volume invite reflection on the uses to which Renaissance culture put maternal stereotypes the virgin mother the cruel step dame as well as the powerful fears and desires that mothers evoke assuage and sometimes express in the fantasy world of romance Women in Eighteenth-Century Scotland

Deborah Simonton, 2016-12-05 The eighteenth century looms large in the Scottish imagination It is a century that saw the doubling of the population rapid urbanisation industrial growth the political Union of 1707 the Jacobite Rebellions and the Enlightenment events that were intrinsic to the creation of the modern nation and to putting Scotland on the international map The impact of the era on modern Scotland can be seen in the numerous buildings named after the luminaries of the period Adam Smith David Hume William Robertson the endorsement of Robert Burns as the national poet hero the preservation of the Culloden battlefield as a tourist attraction and the physical geographies of its major towns Yet while it is a century that remains central to modern constructions of national identity it is a period associated with men Until recently the history of women in eighteenth century Scotland with perhaps the honourable exception of Flora McDonald remained unwritten Over the last decade however research on women and gender in Scotland has flourished and we have an increasingly full picture of women's lives at all social levels across the century.
