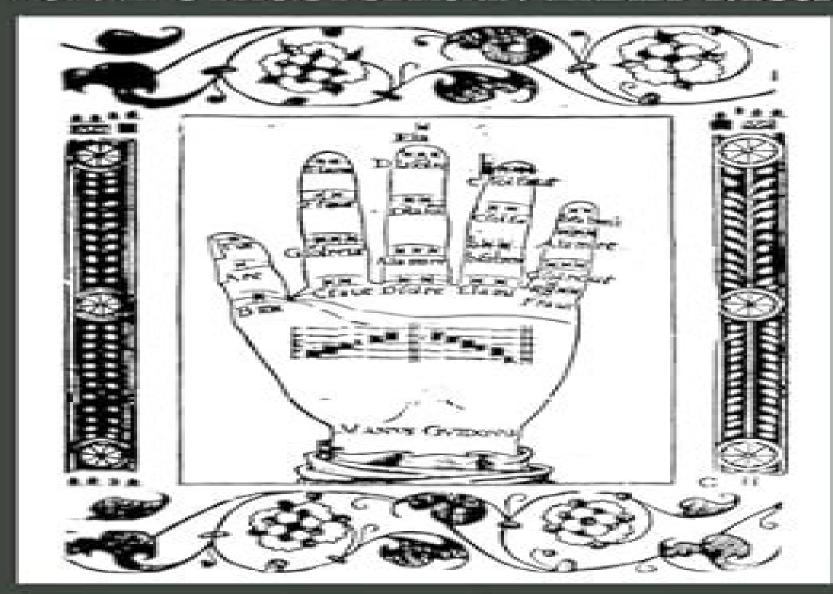

McKinney, 2016-03-23 In the writings of Nicola Vicentino 1555 and Gioseffo Zarlino 1558 is found for the first time a systematic means of explaining music s expressive power based upon the specific melodic and harmonic intervals from which it is constructed. This theory of interval affect originates not with these theorists however but with their teacher influential Venetian composer Adrian Willaert 1490 1562 Because Willaert left no theoretical writings of his own Timothy McKinney uses Willaert's music to reconstruct his innovative theories concerning how music might communicate extramusical ideas For Willaert the appellations major and minor no longer signified merely the larger and smaller of a pair of like numbered intervals rather they became categories of sonic character the members of which are related by a shared sounding property of majorness or minorness that could be manipulated for expressive purposes This book engages with the madrigals of Willaert's landmark Musica nova collection and demonstrates that they articulate a theory of musical affect more complex and forward looking than recognized currently The book also traces the origins of one of the most widespread musical associations in Western culture the notion that major intervals chords and scales are suitable for the expression of happy affections and minor for sad ones McKinney concludes by discussing the influence of Willaert's theory on the madrigals of

composers such as Vicentino Zarlino Cipriano de Rore Girolamo Parabosco Perissone Cambio Francesco dalla Viola and Baldassare Donato and describes the eventual transformation of the theory of interval affect from the Renaissance view based upon individual intervals measured from the bass to the Baroque view based upon invertible triadic entities Consciousness and the Medieval West Fiona McAlpine, 2008 Tonal consciousness in the sense of a clear intuition about which note or chord a piece of music will finish on is as much a part of our everyday experience of music as it is of contemporary music theory This book asks to what extent such tonal consciousness might have operated in the minds of musicians of the Middle Ages given the different tone world found in the modes of Gregorian chant in troubadour and trouv re music in Minnesang and in the early polyphony based upon chant The author's approach is analytical focusing on modality and balancing up to date concepts and methods of music analysis with those insights into their own compositional needs and processes that the people of the Middle Ages provided themselves through their writings about music The book examines a range of both music sources and theoretical sources from the ninth to the thirteenth centuries. Drawing on musicology literary history and the sociology and psychology of sexuality Medieval Sex Lives presents a provocative hypothesis about the power of courtly songs to model inspire and support sexual behaviors and fantasies

British music theory Unlike other English theoretical writings of the period the Synopsis derives many of its aspects from the continental theoretical tradition including the first references in English theory to the modern fractional time signatures that had been invented in Italy in the mid seventeenth century the first references in English to compound time and the first explanations of tempo terms such as Adagio and Presto In these respects the treatise forms an important link between English and continental theoretical traditions and may have encouraged the adoption of Italian principles which became a common feature of English writings by the early eighteenth century The treatise is essentially in two parts The first section of the book comprises rudimentary instruction on understanding notation and intervals descriptions of common vocal ornaments and instruction in the process of learning to sing The second part consists of a selection of psalms songs and catches which are provided as exercises for the singer though several of them require a reasonably advanced degree of skill These pieces provide valuable insight into the way both sacred and secular music might have been performed by amateur musicians in the Restoration period They include 14 rare English madrigal settings by the Italian composer Gastoldi further evidence of the Italian influence which pervades the text This is the first modern edition of the Synopsis and indeed the first **Reappraising the Seicento** Andrew Cheetham, Joseph Knowles, Jonathan edition to appear since its original publication Wainwright, 2014-03-26 Reappraising the Seicento presents new perspectives on some relatively well researched areas of music history and adumbrates some more arcane aspects of the period offered by fledgling scholars and early career researchers in the field of musicology The scope of the title has the potential to warrant a tome on the subject but it is not the intention to provide a comprehensive survey of music in the seventeenth century Instead five essays are presented divided into two sections which represent the research activities of young scholars with an interest in the seicento In the first part of this book compositional procedure in seicento Italy is examined through two different analytical procedures Musical styles and fashions changed considerably throughout Europe in the seventeenth century at the forefront of these changes were Italian composers and performers who found fame and influence in their native countries as well as abroad In the second part of this book the dissemination of Italian music in seventeenth century England and the appropriation and assimilation of contemporary Italian compositional techniques by English composers are considered The phenomenal interest shown in Italian music by English patrons and musicians of the seventeenth century is placed into context and is revealed to be part of a larger historical trend

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
