Nick Fotion argues that once a broader view of theory is accepted it is easier to see that there really is no serious conflict between theorists and anti theorists In principle both sides if they overcome their addiction to thinking in terms of grand strong theory formation can accept a role for theories in ethics Theories in ethics can be either grand or local in nature Provided theory creators and users don't expect theories to performs all kinds of impossible tasks e g to deal with all of our ethical problems and be so fully justified that only one theory can be accepted as being correct it is easier to accept them It is also easier to accept the idea that a theorist might very well appeal to more than one theory to help him or her deal with whatever ethical issues bother

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
