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Threads Jane L. Collins, 2009-11-15 Americans have been shocked by media reports of the dismal working conditions in factories that make clothing for U S companies But while well intentioned many of these reports about child labor and sweatshop practices rely on stereotypes of how Third World factories operate ignoring the complex economic dynamics driving the global apparel industry To dispel these misunderstandings Jane L Collins visited two very different apparel firms and their factories in the United States and Mexico Moving from corporate headquarters to factory floors her study traces the diverse ties that link First and Third World workers and managers producers and consumers Collins examines how the transnational economics of the apparel industry allow firms to relocate or subcontract their work anywhere in the world making it much harder for garment workers in the United States or any other country to demand fair pay and humane working conditions Putting a human face on globalization Threads shows not only how international trade affects local communities but also how workers can organize in this new environment to more effectively demand better treatment from their distant corporate employers Unmaking the Global Sweatshop Rebecca Prentice, Geert De Neve, 2017-07-31 Anthropologists and ethnographers examine the global garment industry s impact on workers well being The 2013 collapse of Rana Plaza an eight story garment factory in Savar Bangladesh killed over a thousand workers and injured hundreds more This disaster exposed the brutal labor conditions of the global garment industry and revealed its failures as a competitive and self regulating industry. Transnational Tortillas Carolina Bank Muñoz, 2016-05-02 This book looks at the flip side of globalization How does a company from the Global South behave differently when it also produces in the Global North A Mexican tortilla company Tortimundo has two production facilities within a hundred miles of each other but on different sides of the U S Mexico border The workers at the two factories produce the same product with the same technology but have significantly different work realities This global factory gives Carolina Bank Mu oz an ideal opportunity to reveal how management regimes and company policy on each side of the border apply different strategies to exploit their respective workforces vulnerabilities.
