Memories of the Way We Were D. D. Rocca, 2023-04-28 I stood in front of the headstone which read Rita Rocca Nee Tomlin 15 6 1942 21 10 2020 and thought Is this all there is Her name on a headstone with mine to follow I remembered a warm May Day in 1948 when we both kneeled at the same altar waiting for a priest to give us our first taste of Jesus She in her white dress was wondering if the day would yield enough for a new doll and pram while I wondered if mine would yield enough for roller skates and maybe a new football I recalled the honeymoon in Jersey in 1963 Miss World at the Royal Albert Hall in 1980 and the ball that followed at the Savoy Hotel I said Sorry girl I can t give you a Taj Mahal but I will write a book which will hopefully make us more than just names on a tombstone Standing's Continental Run, comprising a glance at the chief cities of Europe, including Brussels, Amsterdam, Cologne, Strasbourg, Berlin, Vienna, Paris,&c.; and also the chief parts of the Rhineland scenery James STANDING,1874 Flora! Flora Macdonald, Geoffrey Stevens, 2021-10-15 Flora Isabel MacDonald politician humanitarian adventurer and role model for a generation of women was known across Canada and beyond simply as Flora In her memoir co authored by award winning journalist and author Geoffrey Stevens she tells her personal story for the very first time Flora describes her amazing journey from her childhood and her time at secretarial school in Cape Breton through her years in backroom Progressive Conservative politics to elected office and her appointment as Canada's first female minister of foreign affairs Finally she details her exceptional humanitarian work in India and in war torn Africa and Afghanistan Flora was driven by a lifelong conviction that there is nothing a woman cannot achieve in a world controlled by men and she pursued this conviction in everything she did carving a path for women in Parliament She won international acclaim for bringing 60 000 Vietnamese refugees to Canada and for engineering the rescue of six American hostages in Tehran in a top secret collaboration with the CIA known as the Canadian Caper She exposed the inhumane treatment of inmates at Kingston's Prison for Women She defied male chauvinists in the Progressive Conservative party by running for its leadership and she introduced the Employment Equity Act to guarantee women equal access to federal jobs Flora was brave She was relentless She was controversial She was a force of nature In her own words and drawing from interviews with those who knew her Flora grants us insight into this exceptional woman who changed the course of history The Story of White Hall Centre Pete McDonald, 2018-05-01 Villains Danny Brown, Paul Brittle, 2008-02-10 Aston Villa is one of the biggest and best supported football clubs in Britain the giant from England's second city with a long and distinguished history culminating in an unforgettable European Cup victory in 1982 The story of their terrace army however has never been told until now Like all major clubs Villa have had their hooligans and hardmen and have been involved in some of the fiercest battles of the past four decades VILLAINS traces their gangs from the 1960 s up to the present day Through first person testimony it reveals for the first time the antics of the Steamers who achieved nationwide infamy led by a band of colourful and fearless characters such as Pete the Greek who famously once
