I always assumed Google Translate worked by treating language as a kind of code: the user pours a text into the programme, which then draws on a huge internal dictionary to translate or decode it into another language. It doesn't. Google Translate has no dictionary function. It does not rely on notions of meaning at all. Instead, it trawls through the entire Internet for previous translations of different texts, looking for where requested words and phrases have been translated before (Bellos 2012: 262-267). The translation it then comes up with is based on nothing more than statistical probability. It treats language as a huge resource, one that digital technologies make available in previously unimagined ways. It also relies on the fact that while the possibilities for language use are infinitely various, every language utterance

must also draw on set conventions if it is to be understood. Infinite variation is balanced by generic constraints. Whatever is put into the Net for translation, something like it has almost certainly been entered and translated before.

So is nothing original? Are all our utterances reducible to a set of computational algorithms? Well, yes and no. The books under review here
