Uncommon Threads Bruce Joseph Bourgue, Laureen A. LaBar, 2009-05-01 Despite increasing public awareness of indigenous peoples the Wabanakis remain less known than other First Nations because they were long ago overtaken by European colonies New France Acadia and New England reducing them to small ethnic minorities in what soon became one of North America's most heavily populated regions Their textiles too have been obscured by greater scholarly attention to the work of more western groups Through recent museum exhibits such as The Spirit Sings they began to emerge from obscurity but only now through research on newly discovered and identified examples can they stand in their own right at the forefront of indigenous North American aesthetic achievement Yet they can also be profitably viewed as historical documents that reveal how Wabanakis saw their relationships to the emerging larger communities that surrounded them Uncommon Threads reintroduces a vibrant indigenous textile tradition previously all but forgotten by students of indigenous North American Uncommon Threads Bruce Joseph Bourque, Laureen A. deportations of 1755 Men s and women s wardrobes are described from head to toe from headdresses and hairstyles down to stockings and shoes along with accessories such as buttons buckles and jewellery While Acadians retained many aspects of the fashion systems of France New France and New England a distinctive Acadian identity can be seen to take shape as their dress evolved and was influenced by other regional styles Exploring the possibilities of a new methodology for identifying lost or decayed garments Doda argues that surviving notions sewing tools and accessories the small finds of archaeological sites are important sources of information not only about domestic life but about manufacturing processes dress and textile cultures and the influence of intersecting fashion systems in colonial spaces Fashioning Acadians expands our understanding of Acadian lives and their connections to both the Atlantic world of goods and the landscapes of Nova Scotia Maine in 112 Objects: From Prehistory to Modern Times Bernard P. Fishman, 2019-04-04 Founded in 1836 the Maine State Museum is America's oldest state museum and is known to many as Maine's Smithsonian because of the breadth and diversity of its holdings nearly a million objects covering every aspect of the state's cultural biological and geological history and the thousands of stories its collections tell For this book the museum selected and photographed 112 artifacts and specimens that together tell an epic story of the land and its people from prehistoric times to the present It is a story covering 395 million years a story told with a walrus skull and fossils tourmaline and spear points mammoth tusks and bone fishhooks Norse coins and caulking irons militia flags and survey stakes treaty documents and wooden tankards a temperance banner and a locomotive Joshua Chamberlain's pistol and a cod tub trawl a Lombard log hauler and a woman's WWII welding outfit L L Bean boots and German POW snowshoes and many more objects from the museum s collections Short narratives written by museum curators are woven around each item including photos of related objects and the ensemble has been honed polished and introduced by museum director Bernard Fishman This is a book that historians and Maine residents and visitors will delve into again and again unearthing new treasures with each reading The Many Captivities of Esther Wheelwright Ann M.
