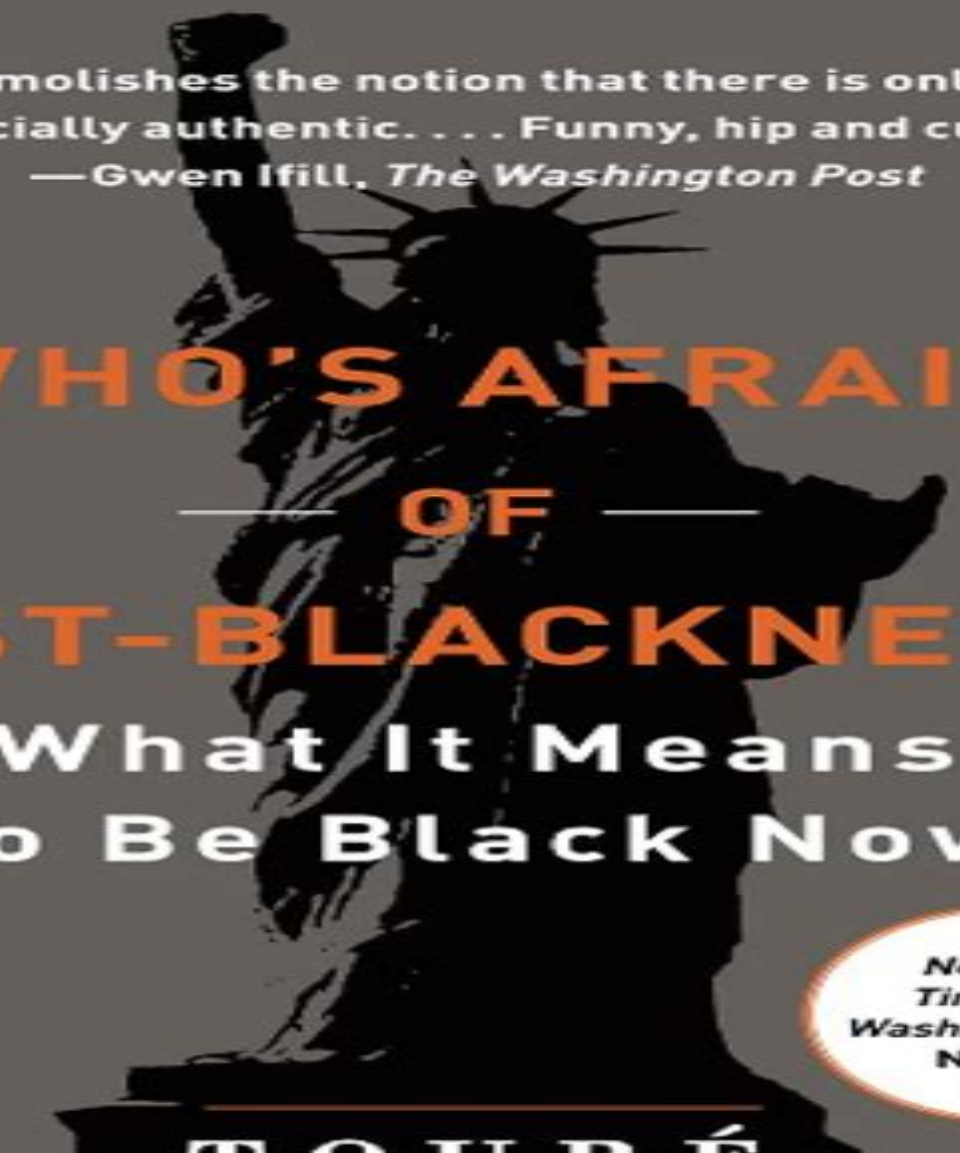

durational process that can never be fully resolved but must be accounted for in thinking about art and visual culture Queer feminist durationality is a mode of relational interpretation that affects both art and interpreter potentially making us more aware of how we evaluate and give value to art and other kinds of visual culture

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
