Writings on Art and Literature Sigmund Freud, 1997 Despite Freud's enormous influence on twentieth century interpretations of the humanities there has never before been in English a complete collection of his writings on art and literature These fourteen essays cover the entire range of his work on these subjects in chronological order beginning with his first published analysis of a work of literature the 1907 Delusion and Dreams in Jensen's Gradiva and concluding with the 1940 posthumous publication of Medusa's Head Many of the essays included in this collection have been crucial in contemporary literary and art criticism and theory Among the subjects Freud engages are Shakespeare s Hamlet The Merchant of Venice King Lear and Macbeth Goethe's Dichtung und Wahrheit Michelangelo's Moses ETA Hoffman's The Sand Man Dostoevsky's The Brothers Karamazov fairy tales the effect of and the meaning of beauty mythology and the games of aestheticization All texts are drawn from The Standard Edition of the Complete Psychological Works of Sigmund Freud edited by James Strachey The volume includes the notes prepared for that edition by the editor In addition to the writings on Jensen's Gradiva and Medusa the essays are Psychopathic Characters on the Stage The Antithetical Meaning of Primal Words The Occurrence in Dreams of Material from Fairy Tales The Theme of the Three Caskets The Moses of Michelangelo Some Character Types Met with in Psycho analytic Work On Transience A Mythological Parallel to a Visual Obsession A Childhood Recollection from Dichtung und Wahrheit The Uncanny Dostoevsky and Parricide and The Goethe Prize Disrupts Religion Philip Salim Francis, Randall Herbert Balmer, 2017 When Art Disrupts Religion lays bare the power of encounters with the arts to unsettle and overturn deeply ingrained religious beliefs and practices Grounded in the accounts of more than 80 Evangelicals who experienced such a sea change of religious identity the book bridges the gap between aesthetic theory and lived religion while exploring the interrelationship of religion and art in the modern West

Thinking of Space Relationally Xiaoxue Gao, 2021-03-15 Since the relational turn scholars have combated methodological universalism nationalism and individualism in researching social spatial transformations Yet when leaving the gaps between the traveling and local epistemic assumptions unattended engaging relational spatial theories in empirical research may still reproduce established theoretical claims Following the sociology of knowledge tradition and taking Critical Realism as a meta theoretical framework Xiaoxue Gao takes relational spatial theories as traveling conceptual knowledge and develops meaningful and context sensitive ways of engaging them in studying the complex urban phenomenon in China She offers conceptual elucidations and methodological roadmaps which leap productively from employing plural causal hypotheses to generating effect based explanations for locally observable events They are exemplified by manifold interrogations of Beijing's Artworld as a conjuncture of particular events Forthcoming Books Rose Arny, 2001 A Child Is Being Killed Serge Leclaire, 1998 The powerful thesis of this book is that in order to achieve full selfhood we must all repeatedly and endlessly kill the phantasmatic image of ourselves instilled in us by our parents We must all combat what the author calls primary narcissism a projection of the child our parents wanted This idea that each of us carries as a burden an unconscious secret of our parents a hidden desire that we are made to live out but that we must kill in order to be born touches on some of the fundamental issues of psychoanalytic theory Around it the author builds an intricate analysis of the relation between primary narcissism and the death drive Each of the book s five chapters begins with one or more case studies drawn from the author's clinical experience as a psychoanalyst In these studies he links his central concern the image of the child created by the unconscious desire of the parents to other issues such as the question of love the concept of the subject and the death drive In the penultimate chapter on transference the author challenges the commonplace understanding of the analyst's impassivity What does such impassivity imply especially in the context of a transferential love between a female patient and a male analyst In replying to this question the author forcefully reassesses the relation of psychoanalysis to femininity to the question What does a woman want Serge Leclaire's overarching thesis leads to a provocative rereading of the Oedipal configuration Leclaire suggests that he is inhabited pursued haunted and debilitated by the child who should have died in order that Oedipus might have been born into life **Magical Thinking Stuart** McWilliams, 2011-12-08 Examining how scholarly writing has contended or conspired with discourses of enchantment from Resistances of Psychoanalysis Jacques Derrida, 1998 In the three essays that make up this the Middle Ages to the present stimulating and often startling book Jacques Derrida argues against the notion that the basic ideas of psychoanalysis have been thoroughly worked through argued and assimilated The continuing interest in psychoanalysis is here examined in the various resistances to analysis conceived not only as a phenomenon theorized at the heart of psychoanalysis but as

psychoanalysis s resistance to itself an insusceptibility to analysis that has to do with the structure of analysis itself Derrida not only shows how the interest of psychoanalysis and psychoanalytic writing can be renewed today but these essays afford him the opportunity to revisit and reassess a subject he first confronted in an essay on Freud in 1966 They also serve to clarify Derrida's thinking about the subjects of the essays Freud Lacan and Foucault a thinking that especially with regard to the last two has been greatly distorted and misunderstood The first essay on Freud is a tour de force of close reading of Freud's texts as philosophical reflection By means of the fine distinctions Derrida makes in this analytical reading particularly of The Interpretation of Dreams he opens up the realm of analysis into new and unpredictable forms such as meeting with an interdiction when taking an analysis further is forbidden by a structural limit Following the essay that might be dubbed Derrida's return to Freud the next is devoted to Lacan the figure for whom that phrase was something of a slogan In this essay and the next on Foucault Derrida reencounters two thinkers to whom he had earlier devoted important essays which precipitated stormy discussions and numerous divisions within the intellectual milieus influenced by their writings In this essay which skillfully integrates the concept of resistance into larger questions Derrida asks in effect What is the origin and nature of the text that constitutes Lacanian psychoanalysis considering its existence as an archive as teachings as seminars transcripts quotations etc Derrida s third essay may be called not simply a criticism but an appreciation of Foucault s work an appreciation not only in the psychological and rhetorical sense but also in the sense that it elevates Foucault s thought by giving back to it ranges and nuances lost through its reduction by his readers his own texts and its formulaic The Decision Between Us John Paul Ricco, 2014-03-31 The Decision Between Us combines an inventive packaging reading of Jean Luc Nancy with gueer theoretical concerns to argue that while scenes of intimacy are spaces of sharing they are also spaces of separation John Paul Ricco shows that this tension informs our efforts to coexist ethically and politically an experience of sharing and separation that informs any decision Using this incongruous relation of intimate separation Ricco goes on to propose that decision is as much an aesthetic as it is an ethical construct and one that is always defined in terms of our relations to loss absence departure and death Laying out this theory of unbecoming community in modern and contemporary art literature and philosophy and calling our attention to such things as blank sheets of paper images of unmade beds and the spaces around bodies The Decision Between Us opens in 1953 when Robert Rauschenberg famously erased a drawing by Willem de Kooning and Roland Barthes published Writing Degree Zero then moves to 1980 and the neutral mourning of Barthes Camera Lucida and ends in the early 1990s with installations by Felix Gonzalez Torres Offering surprising new considerations of these and other seminal works of art and theory by Jean Genet Marguerite Duras and Catherine Breillat The Decision Between Us is a highly original and unusually imaginative exploration of the spaces between us arousing and evoking an infinite and profound sense of sharing in scenes of passionate erotic pleasure as well as deep loss and mourning Of God Who Comes to Mind Emmanuel Lévinas, 1998 The thirteen essays collected in this volume

Subject Guide to Books in Print, 2001 **In Praise of Nonsense** Winfried Menninghaus, 1999-10-01 Shells leafwork picture frames hummingbirds wallpaper decorations hems of clothing such are the examples Kant's Critique of Judgment offers for a free and purely aesthetic beauty Menninghaus's book demonstrates that all these examples refer to a widely

unknown debate on the arabesque and that Kant in displacing it addresses genuinely modern phenomena The early Romantic poetics and literature of the arabesque follow and radicalize Kant's move Menninghaus shows parergonality and nonsense to be two key features in the spread of the arabesque from architecture and the fine arts to philosophy and finally to literature On the one hand comparative readings of the parergon in Enlightenment aesthetics Kant and Schlegel reveal the importance of this term for establishing the very notion of a self reflective work of art On the other hand drawing on Kant's posthumous anthropological notebooks Menninghaus extrapolates an entire Kantian theory of what it means to produce nonsense and why the Critique of Judgment defines genius precisely through the power as well as the dangers of doing so Ludwig Tieck s 1797 rewriting of Charles Perrault's famous Bluebeard tale 1697 explicitly claims to be an arabesque book without any sense and coherence Menninghaus's close reading of this capricious narrative reveals a specifically Romantic as opposed say to a Victorian or dadaistic type of nonsense Benjamin's as well as Propp's L vi Strauss's and Meletinskij's oppositions of myth and fairy tale lend additional credit to a Romantic poetics that inaugurates universal poetry while performing a bizarre trajectory through arabesque ornament nonsense parergonality and the fairy tale **Psychoanalyzing** Serge Leclaire, 1998 Scarcely any theoretical discourse has had greater impact on literary and cultural studies than psychoanalysis and yet hardly any theoretical discourse is more widely misunderstood and abused In Psychoanalyzing Serge Leclaire offers a thorough and lucid exposition of the psychoanalysis that has emerged from the French return to Freud unfolding and elaborating the often enigmatic pronouncements of Jacques Lacan and patiently working through the central tenets of the Ecole freudienne As a concise but nuanced introduction to the subject Psychoanalyzing will prove indispensable to anyone interested in psychoanalysis especially those curious about its Lacanian reconceptualization and the linguistic theory of the unconscious and its effects Leclaire's study is particularly valuable for the way its author links theoretical issues to psychoanalytic practice The opening chapter on listening highlights the necessity and the impossibility of the floating attention required from the analyst while preparing the reader for the following chapters which deal with such topics as unconscious desire how to speak of the body and the intrication of the object and the letter i e the signifier the material support that concrete discourse borrows from language The final chapter on transference shows how the analytical dialogue differs from other dialogues Despite the intricacy of its subject matter the book takes very little for granted It does not simplify the issues it presents but does not assume a reader familiar with the concepts of psychoanalysis let alone a reader acquainted with its French inflection Each basic concept and term is carefully explained so that the reader knows the meaning of transference or primal scene before proceeding to more advanced elements of psychoanalysis Leclaire's text is not intended merely to be user friendly its purpose is to clarify and advance rather than to impress or convert

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
