archival resources to bring it into focus In The Art of Editing Tim Groenland shows that the critical tendency to overlook the activities of editors and to focus on the solitary author figure neglects important elements of how literary works are acquired developed and disseminated Focusing on selected works of fiction by Raymond Carver and David Foster Wallace authors who represent stylistic touchstones for US fiction of recent decades Groenland presents two case studies of editorial collaboration Carver's early stories were integral to the emergence of the Minimalist movement in the 1980s while Wallace's novels marked a generational shift towards a more expansive maximal mode of narrative The role of their respective editors however is often overlooked Gordon Lish's part in shaping the form of Carver's early stories remains under explored analyses of Wallace's fiction meanwhile tend to minimise Michael Pietsch's role from the creation of Infinite Jest during the mid 1990s until the present day Drawing on extensive archival research as well as interviews with editors and collaborators Groenland illuminates the complex and often conflicting forms of agency involved in the genesis of these influential works The energies and tensions of the editing process emerge as essential factors in the creation of fictions more commonly understood within the paradigm of solitary authorship The mediating role of the editor is Groenland argues inseparable from the development form and reception of these works Minimalism and Affect in American Literature, 1970-2020 Oliver Haslam, 2024-09-05 Theorizes the development of a minimalist mode in American fiction since 1970 frequently seen to interrogate US postmodernity Minimalism and Affect in American Literature 1970 2020 responds to existing studies of literary minimalism by pursuing three original and interrelated objectives It provides a more inclusive and precise definition of minimalism that enables further inquiry into the mode It also exposes the presence of minimalism beyond critical demarcations that attempt to limit the aesthetic to a particular school medium movement form or decade Finally it argues that writers of American literary minimalism are uniquely privileged in their ability to formalize precarity and threatening cultural currents into the fragile construct that is ordinary life Building upon theories of affect and the everyday Minimalism and Affect in American Literature 1970 2020 analyses minimalist aesthetics within the works of canonical minimalists alongside writers more frequently associated with other movements Through readings of Ernest Hemingway Joan Didion Raymond Carver Paul Auster and Don DeLillo among others and cultural phenomena ranging from sedation to telephony this book exposes the persistence and political importance of minimalism within American literature from the 20th century into the 21st
