

procurement processing and the products of different types of fibers is it possible to gain real insights into the changing roles played by fibers and textiles in the lives of people in different places and times in the past With relatively rare albeit sometimes spectacular exceptions archaeological contexts offer only poor conditions of preservation for textiles As a result archaeologists are dependent on indirect or proxy indicators such as textile tools e g loom weights spindle whorls and the analysis of faunal remains to explore a range of such proxies and methods by which they may be analyzed and evaluated in order to contribute to an understanding of fiber and textile production and use in the past **Funerary Textiles in Situ** Elsa Yvanez, Magdalena M.
