There are numerous ways that concepts and terminology are used with in sociology to understand how concepts and perspectives are applied to the study of health and social care there for I will now be discussing the fallowing.

Social class:

Social class refers to the idea that the population is divided into groups based on their economic wealth for example like a hierarchy of individuals that share the same social class with similar wealth there are different types of social classes and they are usually split into three groups as fallowing: working class, this class is known as individuals of society that are part of manual jobs and receive minimum wage there for they would be considered as bottom of the hierarchy they usually work in labouring and factory based jobs. Individuals in working class tend to have low level of education and there can be numerus reasons to why individuals have low education and not being able to peruse higher level of education but one being is the fact working class people find it harder to afford equipment for school and being able to afford books to better their education there for it makes it difficult for them to participate in social mobility (idea of moving from classes) a reason being is because of restrictions not allowing them , people in working have no choice but to remain in their social position because their inability to move up there for they must remain in their jobs however it can be argued that working class can achieve social mobility for example looking at Richard Branson he was from a working-class background but was able to move to the upper class however the like hood of working class partaking in social mobility is very unlikely, but it can be achieved.
