The Wherewithal of Life Michael Jackson, 2013-08-03 The Wherewithal of Life engages with current developments in the anthropology of ethics and migration studies to explore in empirical depth and detail the life experiences of three young men a Ugandan migrant in Copenhagen a Burkina Faso migrant in Amsterdam and a Mexican migrant in Boston in ways that significantly broaden our understanding of the existential situations and ethical dilemmas of those migrating from the global south Michael Jackson offers the first biographically based phenomenological account of migration and mobility providing new insights into the various motives tactics dilemmas dreams and disappointments that characterize contemporary migration It is argued that the quandaries of African or Mexican migrants are not unique to people moving between traditional and modern worlds While more intensely felt by the young seeking to find a way out of a world of limited opportunity and circumscribed values the experiences of transition are familiar to us all whatever our age gender ethnicity or social status namely the impossibility of calculating what one may lose in leaving a settled life or home place what one may gain by risking oneself in an alien environment the difficulty of striking a balance between personal fulfillment and the moral claims of kinship and the struggle to know the difference between concrete and abstract utopias the first reasonable and worth pursuing the second hopelessly unattainable Forced Migration, Gender and Wellbeing Selma Porobić, Brad K. migrants and what their experiences ultimately mean to them Remittance as Belonging Hasan Mahmud, 2024-10-11 Remittance as Belonging Global Migration Transnationalism and the Quest for Home argues that migrants remittances express their sense of belonging and connectedness to their home country of origin making an integral part of both migrants ethnic identity and sense of what they call home Drawing on three and a half years of ethnographic fieldwork with Bangladeshi migrants in Tokyo and Los Angeles Hasan Mahmud demonstrates that while migrants go abroad for various reasons they do not travel alone Although they leave behind their families in Bangladesh they move abroad essentially as members of their family and community and maintain their belonging to home through transnational practices including remittance sending By conceptualizing remittance as an expression of migrants belonging this book presents detailed accounts of the emergence growth decline and revival of remittances as a function of transformations in migrants sense of belonging to home **Impossible Refuge** Georgina Ramsay, 2017-10-16 Impossible Refuge brings the perspectives of refugees into rapidly emerging dialogues about contemporary situations of mass forced migration asking what does it mean to be displaced Based on multi-sited ethnographic research conducted with refugees from Central Africa living in situations of protracted asylum in Uganda and resettlement in Australia the book provides a unique comparative analysis of global humanitarian systems and the experiences of refugees whose lives are interwoven with them The book problematises the solutions that are currently in place to resolve the displacement of refugees considering that since displacement cannot be reduced to a politico legal problem but is an experience that resonates at an existential level it cannot be assumed that politico legal solutions to displacement automatically resolve what is fundamentally an existential state of being Impossible Refuge therefore offers a new theoretical foundation through which to think about the experiences of refugees as well as the systems in place to manage and resolve their displacement.
