The Trinitarian Self Charles K Bellinger, 2010-08-27 The Trinitarian Self argues that the insights of three key authors Soren Kierkegaard Eric Voegelin and Rene Girard can be synthesized to produce a Trinitarian theological anthropology Their reflections on the deep roots of human behavior illuminate three structural dimensions of human existence the temporal trajectory of selfhood the vertical axis God and nature and the horizontal plane of cultural formation An understanding of these dimensions and how they interrelate proves very fruitful in making sense of a wide variety of pathological forms of behavior that human beings have engaged in during the modern era This work links together in thought provoking ways various realms of thought such as Trinitarian theology a plea for a New Copernican Revolution that will result in a broadly held psychological understanding of violence the ethics of war and peace atonement theologies and critical commentaries on terrorism and the War on Terror The interplay between these topics will likely prove very stimulating to a wide variety of readers Peacemaking and Religious Violence Roger A. Johnson, 2009-09-01 From its very beginning Christian faith has been engaged with religious violence The first Christians were persecuted by their co religionists and then by imperial Rome Jesus taught them in such circumstances not to retaliate but to be peacemakers to love their enemies and to pray for their persecutors Jesus s response to religious violence of the first century was often ignored but it was never forgotten Even during those centuries when the church herself persecuted Christian heretics Jews and Muslims some Christians still struggled to bear witness to the peace mandate of their Lord In the thirteenth century Thomas Aguinas wrote a theology to help his Dominican brothers persuade Cathar Christians to return to their Catholic faith peacefully Ramon Lull a Christian student of Arabic and the Qur an sought to help his fellow Christians recognize the elements of belief they shared in common with the Muslims in their midst In the fifteenth century Nicholas of Cusa a Church Cardinal and theologian expanded Lull s project to include the newly discovered religions of Asia In the seventeenth century Lord Herbert an English diplomat and lay Christian began to identify the political union of church and government as a causal factor in the religious warfare of post Reformation Christendom One and a half centuries later Thomas Jefferson a lay theologian of considerable political stature won a political struggle in the American colonies to disestablish religion first in his home colony of Virginia and then in the new nation he helped to found All five of these theologians reclaimed the peace mandate of Jesus in their response to the religious violence of their own eras All of which points us to some intriguing Christian responses to religious violence in our own century as recounted in the epilogue <u>Dietrich Bonhoeffer and the Ethical Self</u> Clark J. Elliston, 2016-10-01 Dietrich Bonhoeffer's work has persistently challenged Christian consciousness due to both his death at the hands of the Nazis and his provocative prison musings about Christian faithfulness in late modernity Although understandable given the popularity of both narrative trajectories such selective focus obscures the depth and fecundity of his overall corpus Bonhoeffer's early work and particularly his Christocentric anthropology grounds his later expressed commitments to responsibility and

faithfulness in a world come of age While much debate accompanies claims regarding the continuity of Bonhoeffer's thought there are central motifs which pervade his work from his doctoral dissertation to the prison writings This book suggests that a concern for otherness permeates all of Bonhoeffer's work Furthermore Clark Elliston articulates drawing on Bonhoeffer a Christian self defined by its orientation towards otherness Taking Bonhoeffer as both the origin and point of return the text engages Emmanuel Levinas and Simone Weil as dialogue partners who likewise stress the role of the other for self understanding albeit in diverse ways By reading Bonhoeffer through their voices one enhances Bonhoeffer's already fertile understanding of responsibility Life in the Spirit Andréa Snavely, 2015-05-12 What would the church look like if Christians saw their lives as constituted by the Spirit's presence to live as Jesus lived In a time when being led by the Spirit is defined more by achieving the American Dream than by Jesus s life answering this question rightly seems all the more critical for the church to survive in a culture increasingly hostile to Christianity Building upon the work of post Constantinians John Howard Yoder and Stanley Hauerwas and upon the Trinitarian Spirit Christology of Leopoldo Sanchez this account of the Christian life provides a framework for seeing one's Christian life as one transformed by the Spirit to live in the resurrection reality of Jesus s sonship with the Father in the Spirit In the process one will discover that for Jesus being led by the Spirit meant trusting his Father to the point of death on a cross trusting God to resurrect him even if he did not save him Should it mean the same for Christians today If so this would require the church to reimagine its ministries for the Spirit to work repentance and faith rather than simple agreement For Christians living in the Spirit their lives might look very different

René Girard and Secular Modernity Scott Cowdell, 2015-11-30 In Ren Girard and Secular Modernity Christ Culture and Crisis Scott Cowdell provides the first systematic interpretation of Ren Girard's controversial approach to secular modernity Cowdell identifies the scope development and implications of Girard's thought the centrality of Christ in Girard's thinking and in particular Girard's distinctive take on the uniqueness and finality of Christ in terms of his impact on Western culture In Girard's singular vision according to Cowdell secular modernity has emerged thanks to the Bible's exposure of the cathartic violence that is at the root of religious prohibitions myths and rituals In the literature the psychology and most recently the military history of modernity Girard discerns a consistent slide into an apocalypse that challenges modern ideas of romanticism individualism and progressivism In the first three chapters Cowdell examines the three elements of Girard's basic intellectual vision mimesis sacrifice biblical hermeneutics and brings this vision to a constructive interpretation of secularization and modernity as these terms are understood in the broadest sense today Chapter 4 focuses on modern institutions chiefly the nation state and the market that function to restrain the outbreak of violence And finally Cowdell discusses the apocalyptic dimension of Girard's theory in relation to modern warfare and terrorism Here Cowdell engages with the most recent writings of Girard particularly his Battling to the End and applies them to further conversations in cultural theology political science and philosophy Cowdell takes up and extends Girard's own warning concerning an
